# A sea of wellbeing for the whole family

# A coast outlined by golden sand and white cliffs

From the golden beaches of **Lignano** and **Grado**, with their shallow and sandy seabeds, to the rocky inlets of the Duino nature reserve, where vertical cliffs drop sheer into the waves. Relaxation, safety and fun, but also the charm of new experiences, carried out in natural surroundings, days full of activities. The sea in Friuli Venezia Giulia contains many offers in one. It is an ideal family tourist destination with certified facilities and a welcome programme which has been specially created to meet the needs of children and parents; at the same time, the summer in Friuli Venezia Giulia strolls through the shopping streets of Lignano Sabbiadoro; or relaxes in the silence and serenity of Grado's lagoon and sandbanks; or follows the natural rhythm of the fishermen in Marano Lagunare. The 130 km of curved coastline washed by the **Adriatic Sea**, provide visitors with a wide range of seaside resorts.

**Lignano Sabbiadoro** – "Italy's little Florida" by Ernest Hemingway – Synonymous with vivacity, **Sabbiadoro**, together with **Lignano Pineta** and **Lignano Riviera**, is a vibrant world of sports and healthy activities. Besides meticulous entertainment and Wi-Fi internet access, windsurfing sailing, SUP, canoe and parasailing schools can be found on the beach, as well as gentle gymnastics lessons and water Nordic walking. The wide range of recreational opportunities for children and teenagers, which include six different theme parks, numerous sporting activities and the characteristics of the coast itself – **8** 



**kilometres of golden sand**, shallow waters and a calm sea – make Lignano a perfect holiday destination for families too.



A relaxing thalassotherapy centre loved by Austro-Hungarian Emperors: along with the natural beauty of its lagoon and an exceptional microclimate that ensures a permanently sun-drenched coast, **Grado** is also known as the *Island of the Sun* thanks to the fact that all of its coasts are south facing. It boasts the considerable beneficial effects of its sand and iodine-rich air, as well as the **Italian record for Blue Flag (Bandiere Blu)** beaches. A true family destination, the town is often associated with its **spas** and its **thermal water park,** made up of an 85-metre ergonomic swimming pool equipped with

whirlpool, small waterfalls, thermal pools, springboards and water games. Don't miss out on a stroll in the elegant streets of the historic town centre, a real gem of Venetian architecture. A maze of narrow and charming alleys and *calli*, here you can find the best local food and wine, traditionally based on fresh fish.

There is also something for nature lovers and more adventurous visitors: the steep rugged cliffs of the Karst coast. Why not enjoy the splendid panorama as you perch high on the winding road along the coast leading to Trieste? In summer, the whole shoreline teems with life in a swarm of small bathing establishments. The ones that stand out most are the fascinating Bay of Sistiana, with its view on the Duino Castle and the historical *Pedocin* in the city centre: the only beach in Europe with a wall that **separates women from men**, a legacy of the Austro-Hungarian era.

## Not to be missed:

- ✓ **Muggia**, the only Istrian town remaining in Italy, that boasts the remains of an ancient Roman settlement. The old town centre, crossed by the typical narrow *calli*, is stage to one of Italy's oldest carnivals
- ✓ **Marano Lagunare**, whose **Millenaria tower** emerges from the historic town centre, which is made up of typical Venetian narrow *calli* streets and small squares



- ✓ Those who like sailing can be sure of finding the perfect holiday in Friuli Venezia Giulia, with its **25** fully equipped **marinas** and a total of **15,000 berths**
- ✓ A visit to the Natural Reserves of Canal Novo Valley and the Stella river mouth in Marano Lagunare and Cavanata Valley and the Isonzo river mouth, which offer a number of ways to learn more about nature, from open-air activities (e.g. birdwatching) to workshops. Alternatively, along the coast of Trieste lie the Natural Reserve of the Duino Cliffs and the Miramare Marine Nature Reserve
- ✓ Portopiccolo, a unique Mediterranean hamlet, set in the splendid Duino cliffs, where accommodation, restaurants, shops, a congress centre and a marina can be found. Here, there is also the luxurious SPA by Bakel, a company from Friuli Venezia Giulia and winner of Marie Claire's 2018 Prix d'Excellence de la Beauté award
- ✓ Family Experience Mare, a series of accommodations where families are more than welcome: family dedicated areas, entertainment and the exclusive Family Card available only in participating places. This includes visits to the amusement park, sports activities, customised excursions and many other family-friendly experiences. All reduced-price or free
- ✓ A **boat trip** on the Grado and Marano lagoons in search of typical *casoni* houses, Albergo Diffuso accommodation and unspoiled beaches

# 90 kilometres of slopes for safe and peaceful skiing

Would you like to combine skiing with the thrill of battling against the wind on a sled pulled by a team of dogs? The mushing schools in **Tarvisio** will welcome you with open arms. Do you dream of training on the dazzling slopes where the great ski champions exhibit their abilities? Then **Sella Nevea** is right up your street. Would you like to plunge into a world overflowing with snow activities especially designed for young people? If you choose **Piancavallo** you'll be glad you came. Do you like to combine ski and dancing Après Ski? **Ravascletto/Zoncolan** plays the right music for you. Or would you prefer a sleigh ride? **Sauris** is your ideal location, even to take your

first steps on the snow and experience the Albergo Diffuso hotel. Would you like to see the Dolomites? **Forni di Sopra** is waiting to greet you with the wonderful views of the ski slopes. Are you a biathlete? Then your go-to destination is **Forni Avoltri**, which offers one of Italy's three most prestigious national centers for Nordic-biathlon skiing, as recognised by FISI (the Italian Winter Sports Federation); from there, you can easy reach **Sappada**, one of Italy's most beautiful villages, an alpine island rich in history and tradition, surrounded by the peaks of Val Comelico. Wherever your fancy lies, Friuli



Venezia Giulia can offer a destination to grant your wishes, offering an all-round holiday with much more than simple ski activities.

Friuli Venezia Giulia means safe ski without overcrowding in the five regional ski areas of nearly over 90 kilometres of ski areas of its six ski resorts. A large range of choices with something for everyone, no matter how well you ski, and with guaranteed snow. 110 km of Cross-country ski trail loops in magical surroundings, also by night.

With the FVGcard, the regional "pass-partout", convenience is guaranteed. Card holders can use the ski lift facilities for free: the Tremol chairlift in Piancavallo; the Varmost (1 and 2) chairlifts in Forni di Sopra; the Ravascletto cable way for Mount Zonoclan; Mount Canin's gondola lift to Sella Nevea; and that of Santuario dei Lussari to Tarvisio. The FVGcard also includes the use of Tarvisio and Piancavallo's rail bobsleighs, the participation in many extra-ski activities organised in Carnia and Tarvisio area, and a 25% discounted rate when purchasing a multiday ski pass. Finally, for children up to 8 years old, the ski pass is always free.

## Seven resorts, a thousand things to do

- ✓ Tarvisio: over 25 km of snow-covered ski areas. Make sure you don't miss the Di Prampero, a 4km outdoor trail with a breath-taking view, which has been stage of several Women's World Cup Ski and can also be enjoyed at night every Tuesday and Friday evening. Then there is the Arena Paruzzi and Val Saisera's upper and lower slopes, heaven for cross-country skiers. In Tarvisio, you can also practise ski mountaineering or have a go at the local international dog sledding school. In addition, for the younger ones, there is a playground complete with tobogganing
- ✓ **Sella Nevea**: the **high-altitude slopes**, from 1,100m to over 2,100m, makes it an ideal springtime ski resort. It is also a genuine paradise for **freeride** skiing, boasting a dedicated area for fans of this discipline with training courses, specific activities on how to deal with fresh snow. The location also hosts many European Cup and FIS (Italian Ski Federation) events, which have a dedicated competitive centre for speed disciplines. In Sella Nevea, thanks to the **cross-border link**, it is also possible to **ski across the border** and reach the Slovenian town of Bovec with the same ski pass
- ✓ Forni di Sopra: in a romantic corner of the Friulian Dolomites, part of the famous Dolomite Nordic Ski crosscountry circuit, you can ski along the longest track in Friuli Venezia Giulia. A section is opened at night every



Wednesday evening for ski mountaineering. As well as the 13km cross-country ski trail, 2km of which are opened at night every Monday and Wednesday evening, the town has a playground for the younger ones, a toboggan run, an ice-skating rink and an area for ice climbing, making it one of the most suitable destinations for families. There is a wellness centre with a Finnish sauna, Turkish baths and a swimming pool with an acrobatic water slide for children. The perfect location for sports lovers too: **snow bike excursions** out on the snow, **photographic snowshoe trekking** at altitude and many other activities also organised by the Friulian Dolomites National Park

✓ Ravascletto-Zoncolan: set in the wonderland of the Carnic Alps, it is the funniest Ski resort of the region and has 22km of snow-covered ski areas that reach an altitude of 2,000 metres. Among the various attractions, the most outstanding is the Arena Freestyle, a snow park for progress on the snow. Meanwhile, night ski mountaineering adventurers can go up the Zoncolan 4 and Goles trails on a Tuesday evening, and the most difficult Canalone-Lavet one on a Thursday evening



✓ Piancavallo: 17 km of ski areas with three crown jewels: a large snow park that offers freestylers the opportunity to put their jumps and rails to the test; a boardercross and skicross track for snowboarders and skiers; and a track dedicated to ski mountaineering. Every Wednesday and Friday, the ski mountaineering trail for the ascent and the Salomon slope for the downhill run into the valley can also be used. The bobsleigh on rails experience is thrilling, descending from an altitude of 1,500 metres and nosediving down a 15-degree slope. You can

also practise **snowshoeing**, skating on the ice rink, and **snow tubing**. While the kids can have fun in the Nevelandia playground

- ✓ Sauris: here you can undertake ski mountaineering and take your first steps on the snow, practising cross-country or downhill skiing in a setting where nature reigns supreme. You can go snowshoeing, ride in an evocative sleigh or enjoy the experience of skiing at night on the Sauris di Sotto's ski run. Finally, those who love to relax can spend their time between hay baths, saunas and hydromassage pools in the town's "Borgo dello sport e del benessere" wellness area
- Sappada: the gem of the Upper Piave Valley is full of fun and entertainment for everyone, with 15 km of alpine ski slopes suitable for beginners and advanced skiers, 25 km of cross-country skiing trails with varying difficulty levels, and numerous ski mountaineering trails. But not only. Sappada is also a paradise for non-skiers, who can enjoy ice climbing, winter walks along the Piave river, surrounded by woods or on white slopes, thrilling trails in the adventures park and horseback or horse-drawn carriage rides.

## Did you know that...

- ✓ The rich calendar of winter activities has something for everyone, snowshoeing, sleigh rides and tours with all levels of difficulty. Free with the FVGcard
- ✓ In Claut, besides ice-skating and a curling rink, there is the Ice-park, an ice-climbing tower
- ✓ In Forni Avoltri, there is one of three Italian Winter Sports Federation (FISI) biathlon centres: Piani di Luzza's Carnia Arena is in fact the specialised federal centre for biathlon practice and, during the summer, part of the track is used for roller skiing
- ✓ In **Sappada** you can also find Italy's biggest **snow park Nevelandia**, where cheerfulness reigns suprem: bobsleighs, sleds, rafts, skating rinks, snowmobiling and quad circuits offer fun for all ages



# Jewels of art

#### One thousand facets of art at the border between the East and the West

Elegant and discreet, proud of their own beauty and never exhibitionist, the cities of Friuli Venezia Giulia have travelled the world, listening to foreign languages and meeting distant cultures and religions. For centuries Celts,



Romans, Huns, Lombards, Venetians and Austro-Hungarians passed through these places, all leaving an indelible mark that mingled with local traditions. Thus Trieste "dressed in Hapsburg clothes", Udine became the home of Tiepolo, Gorizia was called the "Austrian Nice" and Pordenone, whose frescoed palaces have earned it the title of painted city, alternates between Roman, Baroque and Gothic influences, where one can find Sacile, the "Garden of the Serenissima Republic of Venice". These indelible marks can also be admired in places that have been recognised by **UNESCO** as World Heritage Sites:

**Aquileia**, ancient city of the Roman Empire; **Cividale del Friuli**, the capital of the first Italian Longobard Duchy; **Palmanova**, a fortress town enclosed in the shape of a nine-pointed star; and **Palù di Livenza**, a pile-dwelling site whose archaeological remains are partially found in the Archaeological Museum of Western Friuli in Pordenone.

The FVGcard is the key to the region's art and cultural treasures. This pass, valid for 2, 3 or 7 days, includes unlimited access to all the main museums and historical and archaeological sites anywhere in the region. It also accounts for participation in the guided tours organised by PromoTurismoFVG in artistic cities or hiring of multilingual audio guides.

Set in an unrivalled corner of the world, between the white karst landscape and the dazzling blue of the northernmost part of the Adriatic Sea, **Trieste**, **Science Capital of 2020**, has always been a vital meeting point between the East and the West because of the central role of its' port. The city that for centuries belonged to everyone and to no one still has the cosmopolitan soul of a place where different cultures, languages, religions and traditions can meet.



**Udine**, the elegant and convivial city, where the refined architecture is linked to the rustic charm of the osterias, the city in which Giambattista Tiepolo's (1696-1770) treasures are kept, Venice school's last great painter. This artist left a number of masterpieces, many of which can be seen in the Archiepiscopal Palace, in the Cathedral and in the Gallery of Historic Art in the castle that overlooks the old town centre. taking part to a guided tour or hiring for free a bicycle you can discover the beautiful sites of the city in complete freedom.



If Trieste reflects its ancient role of regional trade emporium, **Gorizia** has always been the real "melting pot" of Central Europe. It was here, at the crossroads of three European cultures – Latin, Slav and German – and in a proper Border City, that the last wall of the Cold War between Eastern and Western Europe was torn down in 2004. The Hapsburg bourgeoisie loved Gorizia and its mild climate: not by chance the city was called the "Nice of the Adriatic" and, because of its climate, it was chosen as a residence by the last

king of France, Charles X of Bourbon, who moved his sumptuous court to the magnificent noble palace Coronini Cronberg.

**Pordenone** is an elegant town with a charming historical centre, a true mosaic of 16th century palazzos, Romanesque churches, porticoes, frescoed façades, and Gothic and Baroque buildings. A stroll beneath the prestigious arcades of the Corso or a visit to the museums or to the temporary art exhibits will allow you to discover local history and culture. All through the year the city hosts international art, music and literature festivals, thus becoming a dynamic and creative node within the area.

- ✓ Miramare Castle, fairy-tale residence of the Archduke Maximilian of Hapsburg and Charlotte of Belgium. Free with the FVGcard
- ✓ Literary itineraries and visits to the traditional **historical cafés of Trieste**, a legacy of the ancient Central European tradition
- ✓ Visit the Grotta Gigante (Giant Cave) in Sgonico, Europe's largest tourist cave. Free with the FVGcard
- ✓ Udine Castle and the city museums, such as the Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art at Casa Cavazzini. Free with the FVGcard
- ✓ The colours of **Giambattista Tiepolo's frescos** of the Diocesan and Tiepolo's Gallery Museum in Udine. Free with the **FVGcard**
- ✓ The timeless and refined elegance of **Pordenone**, discovering the most important Friulian painter of the Renaissance **Antonio de' Sacchis, called II Pordenone** to whom in 2019 a major exhibition is devoted: The exhibition, curated by art critics Vittorio Sgarbi and Caterina Furlan, will feature 50 frescoes and the same number of drawings, including various works by major contemporary artists, including **Titian, Giorgione and Lorenzo Lotto.** Free with the **FVGcard**
- ✓ Gorizia's medieval castle, Provincial museums, Palazzo Coronini Cronberg. Free with the FVGcard



# **Natural flavours and aromas**

# A kaleidoscope of flavours and 80 million bottles of excellent wine

From boreto a la graisana to frico friulano, by way of cjarsòns carnici. Three great culinary trends — **Central European, Venetian and Slav** — merge in a cuisine that is "Made in Friuli Venezia Giulia", the typical regional flavours appear in a variety of recipes, fruit of the incredible variety of landscapes, environments and climactic conditions, unique in the quality of local products. The **cuisine of Trieste and Gorizia** is an encounter of Hapsburg and Slavic traditions, **Carnia** recipes are prepared using herbs, fruits and mushrooms, and in **Friuli** you can enjoy genuine and tasty meals. And don't forget fish and seafood, which is so abundant in this area.

Local production of **top whites** with **eight DOC zones**, **three DOCG zones** and two **inter-regional DOC zones**, 1.700 vineyards producing **80 million bottles** per year in an area of almost 20,000 hectares, with world famous names, including two true gems, **Ramandolo** and **Picolit**, as well as the **Friulano**, symbol of the regional territory. Friuli wine production, of traditional high quality, has converted most of its vineyards to DOC/DOCG wines, reaching 90% of the total yield. The roots of wine production can be



found in Friuli Venezia Giulia, 80% of the Italian **vine cuttings**, or 30% of the EU and 25% of the world, are produced here. This implies research, innovation, high-quality vine cuttings, the mothers of all wines.

8 DOC zones: Carso, Friuli Colli Orientali, Collio, Friuli Annia, Friuli Aquileia, Friuli grave, Friuli Isonzo, Friuli Latisana

3 DOCG: Picolit, Ramandolo and Rosazzo

2 Inter-regional DOC: Lison Pramaggiore and Prosecco

The **new Friuli Venezia Giulia Wine and Food Route**: a single road that perfectly connects the coast with Friuli Venezia Giulia's mountainous area, passing through the regional hinterland's **hills** and **vineyards**. It networks the region's agri-food and wine-growing resources, together with cultural and environmental ones, with the aim of creating a transversal and integrated product to enhance food and wine tourism, making it more accessible to tourists. The **SVS** (Strada del Vino e dei Sapori, or Wine and Food Route), which involves the entire region, is not a physical itinerary, but a single container within which lie **six different experiences to try** in similar areas: "**Here in our mountains**", "**Here in our hills**", "**Here on our river**", "**Here on our plains**", "**Here in our Karst Plateau**", "**Here on our coast**".

The dedicated website, <u>www.tastefvg.it</u>, allows the gastronaut to find information in order to **create their own food and wine itinerary**. It also provides opening hours that are updated in real time for wine cellars to book guided tours.

- ✓ **DOP**: Montasio cheese, San Daniele ham, Tergeste extra-virgin olive oil, Italian Cacciatora Salamini and Brovada
- ✓ **IGP** (protected geographical indication): Sauris ham, several **traditional products**: grappas, honey, Asìno cheese, white Friuli asparagus
- ✓ 11 Slow Food Presidia: garlic from Resia or strok, Cavasso and Val Cosa onion, formadi frant, turnaria milk cheese, pan di sorc, pestât di Fagagna, pitina, radic di mont, çuç di mont, bean of San Quirino rose of Gorizia.



✓ Traditional products as for example Grappa, honey, Asino cheese, white Friulan asparagus for total amount of 160 traditional products

# **Curiosity:**

Friuli Venezia Giulia, with its 2500km of permanent and pure fresh waters, is the first region in Italy for rainbow **trout** breeding, covering 40% of national produce.

# **Typical dishes and products**

- ✓ Trieste: jota, large sardines breaded and fried, ribaltavapori, Trieste-style salted cod, fish soup, scampi alla busara, mussoli clams, dandoli (date mussels), sarde in savôr (sweet and sour sardines), Trieste ham, cave cheese (Jamar), Karst ham. Not to be missed are the typical bolliti (boiled meat) or a break in the osmizzas (wine-tavern) on the Karst plateau
- ✓ Gorizia: potato gnocchi with plums drizzled with melted butter, cinnamon and a little sugar, patate in tecia, rosa di Gorizia and raw ham from Cormòns



- ✓ Udine: frico, musèt e brovade, gubana cake, white asparagus, white truffle from Muzzana del Turgnano, raw ham from Sauris (slightly smoked), borlotti beans from Carnia, Malga cheese, sour ricotta cheese and the Kneidl
- ✓ **Pordenone:** *pitina*, Asìno cheese, the *FigoMoro* fig from Caneva, the potatoes from Ovoledo and the Biscuit Pordenone.

**Sea Dishes:** boreto a la graisana (quick cooked fish with garlic, vinegar and black pepper), squids in their own ink, sievoli sotto sal (grey mullets cured in salt for two or three months)

**Mountain Dishes:** *cjarsòns* (ravioli with a contrasting sweet and savoury filling), *savôrs* (a special dish of chopped vegetables), *toc in braide* (cornmeal mush, Montasio crème, butter, smoked ricotta). *Sot la trape* (a particular kind of cheese marinated in marc), the *Gepichta Kropfn* and the carnival dessert of Sappada are worth a try as well

Itineraries are easier and convenient with the **FVGcard**, Friuli Venezia Giulia's destination card, that offers a wide range of **discounts and free entries** to be used in services and tourist attractions throughout the region.

Friuli Venezia Giulia has its own special kind of hospitality, too. A wide range of alternative accommodations are available to

dive into authentic rural life. For instance, you might choose to stay in an **agritourism** farm or one of the rustic **malghe**. Amongst the alternative kinds of accommodation, you can find bed&breakfasts as well as "**Albergo Diffuso**" – an innovative concept of accommodation developed in Friuli Venezia Giulia - that lets you combine the service of a hotel with the freedom of a holiday apartment. Visitors stay in ancient houses in small towns or villages, which have been perfectly restored, decorated and equipped in the typical mountain tradition, but with access to all the services of a hotel, at extremely competitive prices. Giulia's **Bed&Breakfasts** have a renewed quality system that allows the accommodation, at the same facility, of small groups of maximum eight people. Tourists may choose among three categories: "standard", "comfort" or "superior".

## Places and traditions worth discovering

- √ The 12 "Most beautiful Italian villages" in Friuli Venezia Giulia: Clauiano, Cordovado, Fagagna, Gradisca d'Isonzo, Palmanova, Poffabro, Polcenigo, Sappada, Sesto al Reghena, Travesio, Valvasone Arzene and Venzone
- ✓ Sacile, the "garden of the Serenissima", a place to discover the grace of Venetian-style Renaissance buildings, walking among alleys, bridges and noble palaces
- ✓ Palmanova, in 2017 named a UNESCO World Heritage Site and already a national monument, is the perfect fortress town enclosed within a nine-pointed star
- ✓ Passariano's **Villa Manin**, a Venetian residence with a Paladian footprint, where Napoleon signed the Treaty of Campoformido. Today it is a renowned venue for international exhibitions
- ✓ The Medieval castle of Ragogna, which hosts Scriptorium Foroiuliense one of the few schools teaching the ancient art of calligraphy in Italy
- ✓ The land of castles in the Friuli hills, steeped in history and ancient manors
- ✓ Venzone, declared a national monument. As well as being the only fourteenth-century fortified town in Friuli Venezia Giulia, it is also one of the most extraordinary examples of artistic and architectural restoration: a technical and cultural intervention allowed for the recovery of the hamlet's original identity, carefully reconstructing its buildings and imposing Medieval walls, stone by stone



- ✓ Erto e Casso, Forni di Sotto, Lauco, Ravascletto, Sauris, Socchieve and Sutrio are Friuli Venezia Giulia's genuine traditional hamlets. They are the proud guardians of ancient architecture and traditions
- ✓ Val Resia, where language, traditions and folklore have remained unchanged for almost 15 centuries



- √ 4 "Bandiera Arancione" (Orange Flag) villages appointed by the Italian Touring Club: Cividale del Friuli, Maniago, San Vito al Tagliamento and Sappada
- √ 4 of Friuli Venezia Giulia's "Borghi Storici Marinari" (Historic Coastal Villages): Grado, Marano Lagunare, Muggia and Duino Aurisina
- ✓ **Sappada** is a German-speaking linguistic island and a place where **ancient traditions** and architecture have remained intact over time, such as the local buildings made almost entirely of wood according to the "**Blockbau**" system, with horizontal logs interlocked at the corners and resting on a stone base

#### Connoisseurs corner

- ✓ **Looking for osmize on the Karst:** private houses of winemakers, where you can taste typical, local, home-grown dishes at certain times of the year. How can you find them? Look out for the branch!
- ✓ Food and wine tasting tours along the wine and food routes, such as Collio in Vespa
- ✓ San Daniele del Friuli, the homeland of the renowned prosciutto which boasts the highest number of tasting rooms in Italy. Located in a marvellous historic centre, the town is home to the oldest public library in Italy, the Guarneriana library

The perfect peaks reaching skyward from the Friulian Dolomites, which were listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site

**in 2009,** and the **Julian** and **Carnic Alps** form the ideal frame for the lush green valleys. Acting as the region's natural frontiers, the Alpine chains preserve pearls of rare beauty, such as **Sauris**, a symbol of the excellent food and wines of Friuli, or the **Resia Valley**, where the language and traditions of an ancient Slavic race have survived in an unspoilt environment since the 7<sup>th</sup> century. Or the **Tarvisio area**, where three natural and cultural borders meet and enclose startling summits that climbers from all over Europe long to conquer.



But if you descend from the mountains to the sea you will discover the **Grado and Marano Lagoons**, a splendid landscape teeming with biodiversity, a stretch of **16,000 hectares** 

between sea and land, where it is possible to find the *casoni*: simple shelters that were used by the lagoon fishermen in the past.

For those who love all forms of nature, Friuli Venezia Giulia offers 3 Natural parks, as well as about twenty biotypes and 13 nature reserves. From a rushing, tumbling mountain stream to the unhurried thrill of a climb, there's always a new emotion to stir you. In Friuli Venezia Giulia nature and sport are two inseparable words. If you're someone who's always on the go there is always something to do: rock climbing, trekking, mountain climbing, paragliding, gliding, mountain biking, horse riding. # **Living history**

# From the Ancient Romans to the Cold War: history was made here

Put yourself in the shoes of a legionary on watch among the pillars of the Roman forum, brandish a double-edged sword left behind on the battlefield by the Lombards, and discover traces of the "Iron Curtain" of the Cold War. Walk along paths trodden by a young German officer called Rommel, walk along the trenches that inspired the poet Giuseppe Ungaretti and search for the rooms of a fortress in the midst of powder magazines, gun batteries and

tunnels. The past is truly in the air in Friuli Venezia Giulia, a region covered by **battlefields** and places where history was made, deep in the heart of Europe and open towards the Adriatic Sea. This strategic position has often meant Friuli Venezia Giulia was at the centre of great conflicts and of some of the most significant moments in history. It was here that the ancient Romans built the fourth town of Europe, **Aquileia**, town where the most extensive mosaic floor of Europe is kept in the Paleo-Christian Basilica, declared World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1998. The Lombards, who were



warriors and craftsmen, horsemen and goldsmiths, shaped the land and built a metropolis called *Forum Iulii* – now **Cividale** – from which the name Friuli is derived and where a small **Lombard Temple**, true jewel of ancient art, can be found, also a UNESCO Site since 2011. Later, the area became the favourite playground of the Hapsburg Empire.

#### World War I

This region was the principal scenery of the Italian frontline for over two and a half years during WWI. Hundreds of thousands of Italian and Austro-Hungarian soldiers faced each other in twelve great battles between May 24<sup>th</sup>, 1915 and the end of October 1917, on the Karst plateau and Julian Prealps, at the Slovenian border. Behind them, the Friuli plains were transformed into a great military machine of backroads, needed to supply logistic support to all the soldiers on the frontline. Udine then became the military capital of Italy from 1915 to 1917. On 24th October 1917, the situation changed abruptly when an Austro-German attack triggered what is universally known today as the "Retreat of Caporetto" and moved the frontline along the Piave river. After a year of Austro-Hungarian military administration, the defeat of the Habsburg Empire brought the current Friuli under the Savoy, while Trieste, which



up until that moment had been one of the main Austro-Hungarian towns, became part of the Kingdom of Italy for the first time.

Such history can now be explored by visiting the countless traces that the conflict left in Friuli Venezia Giulia, creating a truly gigantic open-air museum. The Isonzo Karst, Natisone Valleys, and the Carnia and Tarvisio mountain peaks preserve trenches, fortifications, military posts and remains of frontline barracks. In the Tagliamento hill area, up to the Friulian Dolomites, the tragic events of the October-November 1917 retreat can

be retraced. In Trieste, one of the symbolic cities of Italian twentieth-century history, and on the Karst Plateau, Austro-Hungarian and Italian remembrances co-exist as evidence of how the memories of these events are still alive.

As well as the original traces of the conflict, there are also the resources dedicated to remembrance of the conflict, built during subsequent years: from the classic museums (e.g. **First World War Museum of Gorizia and Ragogna, and the Diego De Henriquez War Museum for Peace in Trieste**), where thousands of the period's military and other objects are kept; to the multimedia Museums as Redipuglia and Monte San Michele, opened in 2018. Furthermore, Monuments were built to remember the most important moments of the conflict: the memorials (e.g. **Redipuglia War Memorial**, where the remains of over 100,000 fallen soldiers rest) and the **Austro-Hungarian cemeteries** (such as those of **Aurisina, Prosecco and Fogliano**).



All the itineraries, open-air museums and WWI locations can be found on the **www.turismograndeguerrafvg.it**, portal, the result of the inter-regional project of the same name, that saw Friuli Venezia Giulia as the lead region, alongside Veneto, Lombardy and the autonomous provinces of Trento and Bolzano.

The schedule of **free guided tours** dedicated to the **routes of the Great War throughout Friuli Venezia Giulia** is abundant. From the Karst Plateau surrounding the city of Trieste to the peaks of the mountains on the Austrian border, routes can be travelled, accompanied by expert historians and authorised guides. They are able not only to tell you the facts and recollections, but also to relive the experiences of the soldiers posted to the frontline.

From 2017, an audio guide will also be available (in Italian, English and German) to be able to visit the Redipuglia monumental area and the open-air museum of the Sinkhole of the 15th Marksmen Regiment (Dolina del XV Bersaglieri), behind the famous memorial.

Throughout the year, there will also be events and exhibitions in First World War locations in the form of projects funded by the Department of Culture.

#### Not to be missed

- ✓ Palmanova, the perfect fortress town enclosed within a nine-pointed star and a recognised UNESCO World Heritage Site
- ✓ Parco 97 Prosecco military training camp and Parco 40 the coastland trench, 2 open-air museums on the outskirts of Trieste, inaugurated in 2017, that tell the story of the Austro-Hungarian side-lines in the defence of the city
- ✓ Victory Lighthouse, Piazza Unità d'Italia and Audace Pier in Trieste, symbols of the city's passage from the Habsburg Empire to the Kingdom of Italy
- ✓ The **Redipuglia Memorial**, the largest Italian memorial and one of the biggest in Europe, is home to the remains of over 100,000 soldiers who fell during the First World War
- ✓ **Gradisco d'Isonzo**, one of the most beautiful villages in Italy, with its Venetian fortress dating back to the fifteenth century and built to defend against Turkish invasions
- ✓ èStoria, International History Festival
- ✓ Sesis Pass, Mount Peralba: there are numerous shooting posts and some shelters carved into the rock on the slopes and the summit of Mount Peralba, the Sesis Pass and Sasso del Bersagliere. The paths towards Sesis Pass and Mount Peralba start at Rifugio Calvi, a mountain hut accessible by a dirt road from the junction for the Piave Springs
- ✓ Monte Chiadenis: on Monte Chiadenis, you can see ruins of barracks with stone walls, as well as cave and group shelters
- ✓ To learn more, visit the **Small Museum of the Great War in Borgata Mühlbach** in Sappada.

In a region where mountains, sea and hills cluster together in just over 100 km, 7 golf courses with 18 holes are evenly distributed across the whole area enabling you to immerse yourself in a variety of incredibly beautiful natural settings. Friuli Venezia Giulia is also the leader of *Italy Golf&More* project, a golf promotion programme in eight regions (Emilia Romagna, Liguria, Lombardy, Apulia, Sicily, Veneto and Lazio) and FIG (Italian Golf Federation), which aims at enhancing the national golf circuits, by combining sports with other activities, such as food and wine tours, guided tours to famous art cities, excursions, horse-riding, rural tourism and much more.

**Lignano Golf Club:** 18 holes (**6,345 m, par 72**), where lakes and bunkers appear, suitable for all. Practice range with 9 covered tees, putting green, pitching green, changing rooms, bar, restaurant, hotel, golf bag rental, e-carts, gym, beauty centre.

**Grado Golf Club:** 18 holes (**5,746 m, par 72**), famous for the many water obstacles with the lagoon in the background. The club, situated in the splendid Primero Estate, has chipping and putting greens, driving range with 12 covered tees, pro-shop, golf bag, trolley and cart rental, clubhouse, bar, restaurant, changing rooms, pool and tennis (summer only).



**Trieste Golf Club:** 18 holes (**5,810 m, par 70**), in a seemingly level but tricky green course with an unpredictable wind called *bora*. The clubhouse is equipped with changing rooms, video room, green tables, bar and a highly recommended restaurant. The club also has a driving range with 10 covered tees, a pitching green, a putting green, golf bag rent, cart and all over the year open restaurant.

Castello di Spessa Golf Country Club: 18 holes (5,460 m, par 71), deep in the rustic scenery of the Collio vineyards, it is provided with a training Centre, putting green, chipping green, practice bunker, and driving range with 25 floodlit practice ranges, lit up until midnight, pro shop, changing rooms, trolley, bag and e-cart rental, club

house with its own bar and restaurant.

**Udine Golf Club:** 18 holes (**5,890 m, par 72**), for a course designed by the shade of the cherry trees and the gently rounded hills. Driving range, putting green, chipping green, pro shop, changing rooms, trolley and e-cart rental. The clubhouse has its own bar and restaurant.

Castel d'Aviano Golf Club: 18 holes (5,980 m, par 72) in the midst of centuries-old parkland. Equipped with driving range, night lights, lit up putting green, pitching green,

bar, bag and trolley rental, changing rooms.

**Tarvisio Unlimited Golf Club:** 18-hole (**5.693 m, par 70**) designed by the well-known Canadian architect Graham Cooke, with wide fairways on the Alpine plateau, spacious greens and treacherous bunkers. Bar, restaurant, changing rooms, pro-shop, lounge, driving range with covered tees, putting green, pitching green, practice bunkers, trolley rental with GPS.

**Golf Club and Mini golf in Sappada**: the facility has a 9-hole course, a practice area with a clubhouse and two mini-golf courses.

Friuli Venezia Giulia also offers a 6-hole green in Golf Club La Faula in Povoletto, for your first attempts at golfing.

Professional activities can be combined with a programme of tours, team building activities, entertainment, leisure and shopping, cultural or food and wine related visits, thanks to the beauty of an area whose varied landscape – from the Adriatic Sea to the Alps, from the cities of art to the countless wine cellars – is the perfect setting for every requirement.



The consulting service by PromoTurismoFVG is completely free. It provides companies, associations, meeting planners and PCOs with quality services offered by the region for the organization of events and for the acquisition and organization of conferences.

The main conference centre is **Trieste**, that offers top-level and state-of-art congress venues, access to excellent hotel facilities and a proven track record of over twenty years of experience. In Trieste, the flagship is the **Stazione Marittima Congress Palace** (floor space of over **2,000 m²** with **980 seats**, 6 rooms with advanced technical equipment for scientific sessions, 5 rooms for parallel sessions and 400 m² of exhibition space), flanked on three



sides by the sea and located in the city's cultural district. # **Useful information**

General Data - Friuli Venezia Giulia is an autonomous region whose autonomy was granted by a special statute in 1963. It is located in north-eastern Italy and is bordered by Austria to the north, Slovenia to the east, the Adriatic Sea to the south and the Veneto region to the west.

Origin of the name - "Friuli" comes from the Latin Forum Julii, or Julius's forum (dynasty of Julius Caesar or of the gens Julia). "Venezia Giulia" was added by Graziadio Isaia Ascoli's suggestion, a linguist from Gorizia who proposed to replace the name by which the Austrians called the area (Küstenland) with the current one, recalling the Roman tradition of the Regio X Venetia et Histria and of the Alpes Juliae.
